Class Offerings

1100 ENGLISH I 1st semester (.5 CREDIT)

1101 ENGLISH I 2nd semester (.5 CREDIT)

PREREQUISITES: None. Required of all ninth graders.

CONTENT: This is an English course covering grammar, mechanics, writing, literature comprehension, literature interpretation, vocabulary, and library skills.

1106 ENGLISH II 1st semester (.5 credit)

1107 ENGLISH II 2nd semester (.5 credit)

PREREQUISITES: Successful completion of English I.

CONTENT: This is an English course designed to provide the student with practice in the basic skills of writing to communicate effectively and to introduce the student to world literature. Standard English usage and grammar will be studied as they relate to writing. Vocabulary development will be stressed. Students will read and interpret short stories poetry, essays, novels, and drama by authors from various countries and eras.

1116 ENGLISH III 1st semester (.5 credit)

1117 ENGLISH III 2nd semester (.5 credit)

PREREQUISITES: Successful completion of English II.

CONTENT: This is an English class designed to refine writing skills and introduce students to the study of American literature. The student will complete various types of writing projects. Standard English usage and grammar will be studied as they relate to the process of writing. Advanced vocabulary will be studied. The works of major American writers, both fiction and non-fiction, will be covered.

1150 HUMAN COMMUNICATIONS -1st session (.5 credit)

PREREQUISITES: None. Meets oral communication requirement.

CONTENT: Though we spend 75% of our communication time speaking and/or listening, we do not receive formal education in these skills often. This class is designed to help fill the void by practice and evaluation in voice and diction, public speaking, small group discussion, and other oral communication activities.

1200 GOVERNMENT – 1st session only (.5 CREDIT)

PREREQUISITES: None.

CONTENT: This course will familiarize students with the basic skills and concepts needed to successfully complete the social studies courses required during their sophomore, junior and senior years. In addition, students will pass comprehensive assessments covering the United States Constitution and the Missouri Constitution in accordance with state law.

1201 GEOGRAPHY - 2nd session only (.5 CREDIT)

1202 WORLD HISTORY 1st semester (.5 CREDIT)

1203 WORLD HISTORY 2nd semester (.5 CREDIT)

PREREQUISITES: Required for all Sophomores. A/P Honors World History meets this requirement.

CONTENT: This course will deal with some of the most important events and developments in the story of our past. World History will trace the past from different parts of the world in the areas of government and society, science and technology, art and literature, and religion and philosophy.

1204 AMERICAN HISTORY 1st semester (.5 CREDIT)

1205 AMERICAN HISTORY 2nd semester (.5 CREDIT)

PREREQUISITES: Required for all Juniors. Unless enrolled in American History 101 & 102.

CONTENT: First term (1865-1930). This course will explore American History from the Reconstruction to the beginning of the Great Depression. Major units will include the Reconstruction, Industrialization, The Gilded Age, Progressivism, WWI, and the Roaring Twenties. Second term (1930-present time). This course will cover the major social, political and economic issues from 1930 to the election of 1992. Major units will include the Great Depression, WWII, The Cold War, the Civil Rights Movement, the 1950's. The Korean Conflict, the 60's, Watergate, and the presidencies of Carter, Reagan and Bush.

1206 AMERICAN GOVERNMENT 210 (3 CREDIT HOURS – UMKC)

American government and politics, with special reference to the U.S. Constitution. This course meets the state requirement for study of the U.S. and Missouri Constitutions. This course is a required college course at Missouri colleges. Open to 2008 seniors.

1300 SCIENCE I /PHYSICAL SCIENCE 1st semester (.5 CREDIT)

1301 SCIENCE I /PHYSICAL SCIENCE 2nd semester (.5 CREDIT)

PREREQUISITES: None. This class is required for graduation.

CONTENT: Science I is a one credit, two semester course, that investigates all major areas of science: biology, physics, chemistry, earth, and environmental science. Instruction will be inquiry based, and students will be actively engaged in researching practical answers to contemporary issues. At the completion of this course, students will be prepared for success in Science II.

1304 SCIENCE II 1st semester (.5 CREDIT)

1305 SCIENCE II 2nd semester (.5 CREDIT)

PREREQUISITES: Science I.

CONTENT: Science II is a science program which coordinates all major areas of science: Biology; chemistry; earth and space science; and physics. As a context-based program, Science II builds upon interests students bring with them from everyday experiences. Being activity driven, students approach the learning of scientific concepts with motivation and enthusiasm.

1404 ALGEBRA I 1st semester (.5 CREDIT)

1405 ALGEBRA I 2nd semester (.5 CREDIT)

PREREQUISITES: None.

CONTENT: This course is an in-depth study of the foundations of Algebra. Topics include solving and graphing linear and quadratic equations and inequalities, functions, algebraic manipulation, problem solving, and introduction to geometry. The Algebra I curriculum focuses on providing students with a balance between foundational knowledge and real world application. Students will provide and explain solutions, conduct surveys, experiments, and provide conjectures to problems using mathematical concepts.

1406 GEOMETRY 1st semester (.5 CREDIT)

1407 GEOMETRY 2nd semester (.5 CREDIT)

PREREQUISITES: Algebra I.

CONTENT: This course focuses on the basics of Geometry, segments and angles, parallel and perpendicular lines, triangle relationships, congruent triangles, quadrilaterals, similarity, polygons and area, surface area and volume, right triangles and trigonometry, and circles.

1408 ALGEBRA II 1st semester (.5 CREDIT)

1409 ALGEBRA II 2nd semester (.5 CREDIT)

PREREQUISITES: A "C-" or better in Geometry **and** teacher recommendation.

CONTENT: This course includes equations and inequalities, linear equations and functions, systems of linear equations and inequalities, matrices and determinants, quadratic functions, polynomials and polynomial functions, powers, roots and radicals, exponential and logarithmic functions, rational equations and functions, quadratic relations and conic sections, sequences and series, probability and statistics and trigonometry.

1605 BEGINNING CULINARY ARTS (.5 CREDIT)

PREREQUISITES: None

CONTENT: This class is designed to teach the basic concepts necessary for food preparation. Special emphasis will be given to essential cooking skills important for more advanced classes. Areas of study include kitchen equipment, quick breads, cheese, fruits and vegetables and cookies.

1613 CHILD DEVELOPMENT (.5 CREDIT)

PREREQUISITES: None.

CONTENT: Dual Credit. This course is designed to improve the quality of life for Missouri's children by educating students in the care, guidance and roles of children and the family throughout the life cycle. Special attention is paid to the first five years of life. Lessons include family planning, prenatal care, birth, husband/wife relationship and the changing role of the family on the individual and in today's society.

1619 LEADERSHIP CLASS 1st semester (.5 CREDIT)

1619 LEADERSHIP CLASS 2nd semester (.5 CREDIT)

PREREQUISITES: Instructor approval.

CONTENT: This class will focus on developing leadership skills. Students will learn about FCCLA and STOP, parliamentary procedures, goal setting, the planning process and will also develop written and oral communication skills. Students will learn how to organize meetings and activities. They will also prepare for STAR events. Students will teach short lessons, design bulletin boards and display cases.

1700 ART FOUNDATIONS PAINTING AND DRAWING (.5 CREDIT)

PREREQUISITES: None.

CONTENT: Emphasis is on basic drawing and painting fundamentals. The focus is on the elements of line, shape, form, texture, value and color. All work is done in class, experimenting with different media. Art terminology, processing through unique visual art, creativity, and aesthetics.

1711 INTRODUCTION TO CERAMICS (.5 CREDIT)

PREREQUISITES: Art Foundations with "C" average or better.

CONTENT: This course takes a look at the history of ceramics, methods of clay building, ceramic processes and vocabulary. Students are required to hand build projects, learn decorative glazing techniques and the firing process. All work is done in class.

1819 DRIVER'S EDUCATION (.5 CREDIT) 1st SESSION ONLY!!!!

PREREQUISITES: Must be age 15 on or before June 9, 2008. Please be prepared to show proof of age when enrolling.

CONTENT: This course prepares students to take their written and performance exams for their driver's license. Students are required to attend the first 12 days (Session 1) to complete 60 hours of classroom work. Driving time will be done during the 2nd session of summer school. Students

will drive and observe in groups for a total of 30 hours which will be arranged during the first week of classroom work.

1825 A+ SEMINAR : MUST ATTEND 1ST SESSION TRAINING! (.5 CREDIT)

PREREQUISITE: A+ Office signature required, must be a junior or senior, must be enrolled in the A+ Program, must meet A+ criteria: 95% accumulated attendance, maintain GPA of 2.5, maintain citizenship standards

CONTENT: This course, A+ Seminar will help fulfill the state requirements for 50 hours of tutoring/mentoring by students pursuing A+ status. The class will meet for two days of training. The third class day tutors/mentors will receive orientation and classroom assignment in their field school by the building principal. Students will be placed with the same supervising teacher the rest of the semester. Students must provide their own transportation to the field schools. A parent/guardian must sign a transportation waiver.

1800 HEALTH/FITNESS 1st semester (.5 CREDIT)

1801 HEALTH/FITNESS 2nd semester (.5 CREDIT)

PREREQUISITES: Required for freshman

CONTENT: The focus of this class is taking personal responsibility for your health and making the choices to lead a healthy life-style. Topics include mental health, fitness, nutrition, drug abuse, sexually transmitted diseases and first aid. Classroom instruction will include class discussions, group projects, self-evaluation, role-playing, reaction papers and written exams. Physical fitness testing and various exercise programs will be conducted in the gym.

1900 COMPUTER DRIVEN CURRICULUM (CDC)

PREREQUISITES: Approval of the coordinator. Must be credit deficit either by lack of required classes or total number for graduation. Junior or Senior.

CONTENT: This program is for juniors and seniors who have fallen behind in earning credits toward graduation. In order to be successful in this program, good attendance and a good work ethic are essential. There will be opportunity for the student to earn credit in the core areas through the Compass Computer Curriculum Program. To be accepted into this program must have prior approval from Mr. Denney.
